

RESPONSE TO STUDENT CONSULTATION ON EMPLOYABILITY PROVISION IN THE ARTS & HUMANITIES

SUMMARY

This is a response to the consultation on our employability provision which took place between 9 and 22 February 2021. It involved discussion in the Arts and Humanities Board of Studies Student Consultative Forum, and a short questionnaire.

This consultation was open to all undergraduate and postgraduate students currently studying Arts and Humanities modules and qualifications. In total 271 people registered for the forum consultation, with 186 posts made by students. 92 students responded to the questionnaire.

The purpose of the consultation was to explore ways to improve the information, resources and teaching that we provide around employability and personal development. The forum sought students' views on: motivations for studying an Arts and Humanities qualification; our teaching of employability skills; the value of gaining work experience to support students' career goals. The questionnaire aimed to assess students' awareness, use and opinions of the employability resources in the UG Arts and Humanities study website.

Below is a list of some of the major issues raised by students contributing to the consultation, and the steps being taken by the school to address them:

- OU resources must serve the needs of two distinct student cohorts; those who want a qualification to help with employment, and those who seek to study for reasons not linked to employment.
 - The Board of Studies will review the appropriate balance between employability skills embedded in modules and the optional employability resources provided in the Arts and Humanities Study website.
- Students would prefer our teaching around employability to focus on transferable skills rather than vocational ones: they want to know what employers are looking for in Arts and Humanities graduates.
 - Employability resources and initiatives specific to Arts and Humanities subjects already place a strong emphasis on transferable rather than vocational skills. We will look into providing quotes or recorded testimony from employers on the Arts and Humanities subject site.
- Many students are unaware of the employability resources available in the 'Succeed' section of the Arts and Humanities Study website.
 - We will provide links to the A&H Study website (which houses the employability resources) in the first and last week or under the resources tab of all relevant module study planners, and will use module news items and forum posts to alert students to new employability resources.
- Initiatives like FutureYOU and PDP (Personal Development Planning) are valued by students who have engaged with them, but not always recognised as relevant.
 - More of our modules will be mapped to FutureYOU, and it will be linked from either the first and last weeks or the resources tab of module study planners, along with brief explanations of its intended role.
- Additional help would be welcomed with creating tailored searches and alerts in the Opportunity Hub.
 - We will ask our employer engagement team to explore how the use of search criteria in the
 Opportunity Hub can be made more effective and focussed for Arts and Humanities students

The forum was moderated by Bev Smit (Arts and Humanities BoS student representative), Richard Marsden (Director of Teaching, Arts & Humanities), Claire Blanchard (Careers and Employability Consultant), and Clare Spencer (Deputy Director of Teaching, Arts & Humanities. The moderators will provide a summary of discussions to the Arts & Humanities Board of Studies, and recommendations for future actions will be discussed and agreed at the Board of Studies meeting on 13 October 2021.
